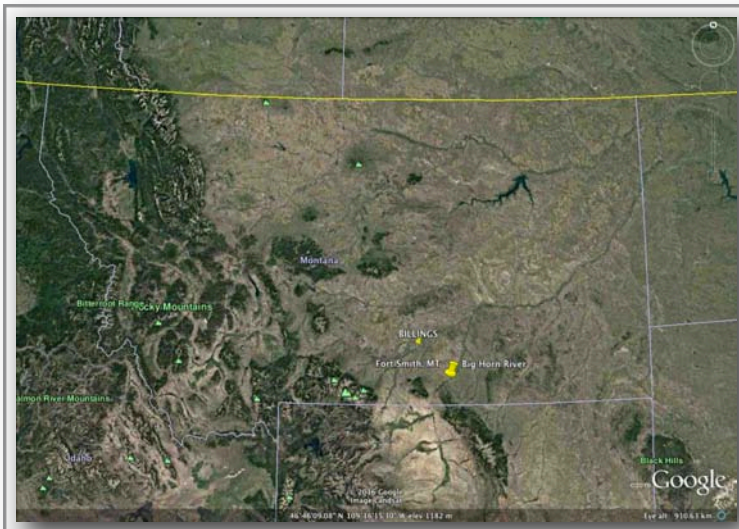

Oregon's Fall Rainbows

Marcelo Reynoso and I flew to Medford via Portland the morning of October 18th, drove over the snowy pass to Klamath Lake, and arrived at Lonesome Duck around 3 o'clock. Reece Lewis had been driving and fishing for a week, picked up John Tindall at the Medford airport. Bless him, that morning he had spent a lot of time at a market with a prepared menu for all four dinners and breakfasts we would be cooking in our lodge. The guest lodge is elegant with room for six. We tried to get two more club members to join us, but none responded to the call, which was a shame. The fishing was spectacular.

Fall at 4,000 feet in southern Oregon is simply beautiful: cold in the mornings, warming throughout the day to about 60 degrees, foliage at its peak. We were blessed with three days of sun that apparently followed some bitter cold rain the prior week.

Marlon Rampy was guide for Reece and myself. I had won a two-for-one which Marlon had donated to the club when he came to speak to us. Reece had won the two-for-one donated by Lonesome Duck for our lodge, so the trip was amazingly inexpensive, after sharing the benefits among the four of us. And cooking on our own after Reece's expert shopping, meant eating like kings, and costing us \$100 each for all four days. The guide for John and Marcelo was Jeff.

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Oregon's Fall Rainbows

The mornings started slow for both boats. With ice in the guides, the water temperature was in the mid-40s, and the surface temp too cold for rising fish. But by noon Reece and I got into a couple of good fish over 20 inches, which is usual for the Williamson which leads the big spawners up from Klamath Lake. The hunt and peck fishing with streamers and nymph rigs was drawing to a close in the afternoon until we reached what we came to call the “2 o’clock corner”. Up to that point I think Reece had caught one and I had two, one small. Suddenly, I had four more beautiful spawn-colored rainbows within a half an hour. Reece, having some trouble with casting long got another. The largest was a 26 incher which took me way downstream and put down the fish for the afternoon. But with bigger fish than either of us were used to, we headed back to the lodge, only about a mile further down, and prepared a dinner of pork loin and some of Reece’s fine wines. Marcelo and John in the other boat mostly fished with dries, finding nymphing and Wooley Buggers did nothing. Marcelo broke off two fish too big for his 5X tippet and his trusty size 18 Adams parachute. John landed one about 17 inches the first day. All the fish brought to our boat were caught using a very sparse Clouser minnow – white on top, a few strands of green flash and a bit more black deer hair below, and a bare shank.

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Oregon's Fall Rainbows

The next two days just got better and better. All caught fish of various sizes. Marcelo caught one 18 and another 23. But for our boat, on Thursday the 2 o'clock corner brought six fish to me, one 27, and Friday I took eight there; lost one, and broke off two. The last fish for me was a 29er. All fish in that spot were over 20 inches. Marlon took my rod after I said, "that's enough", and cast the entire 90 feet of line, caught one more on that first cast, and broke off a second. I caught a total of 11 fish that day and broke off three.

Great way to end the trip, before a little scotch for me and martinis for John and Reece. I'm sure to return, maybe a little earlier in the year next time when the hatches are bigger and the upper stretch is more productive.

The "dry guys" got fewer fish, but the fish size made up for the numbers.

For the record this is a river where long casting is a distinct advantage, but not a necessity, and where casting with dries into the foam requires not only some accuracy but the need to feed out lots of line fast, to get a sufficiently long drift, a technique which Marlon taught both Reece and me.

We left reluctantly Saturday morning.

Trout in the Classroom

Program begins January 2017

As the rainbow trout begin their winter egg-laying cycle, WFF volunteers and local school teachers are preparing their classroom aquariums to receive eggs from the Fillmore Hatchery! The eggs usually arrive during the last two weeks of January.

As we deliver the eggs to each teacher, we discuss the life cycle of the fish and the special nature of the places they live. Students receive an egg in a plastic cup and place it carefully into their specially chilled aquariums. If we are very lucky, some of the eggs are stimulated by the warmth of the air and begin hatching! After the fish hatch, we offer an entomology and ecology classroom demonstration, with live nymphs and other aquatic creatures.

The students find this fascinating and the children's wonderment at this new world never fails to excite those of us who work with the teachers and students in the classroom! It's hands-on science in the best sense of the term!

Hands-on science continues with the release of the fry into local streams, ponds or reservoirs (all with approval of the DFG) at the end of March. WFF volunteers demonstrate fly tying, coach the students in learning to cast a fly, release the fish with students, and oversee a mini-entomology lab in which students catch aquatic insects to examine under a magnifier.

Let me know if you are interested in participating in this rewarding program. I am very happy to have an assistant for classroom visits, as well as volunteers in the field for the fry releases. Especially welcome are the fishing stories and photos our members share with the students. Fun and laughter in an energized learning environment are guaranteed! My email: ccarr10186@aol.com

Modest Dues Increase For 2017

To keep our club financially sound and to continue to provide the programs and activities that we all enjoy, the Board determined that it is necessary to raise dues by \$10.00 in each membership category for 2017. Other than a \$5 increase in 2015, we have been able to hold our membership dues flat for many years. We can no longer afford to maintain the lower rate without jeopardizing vital services and programs. We are also asking our members to make a separate tax-deductible donation to the club to defray a portion of the club's operating expense.

The Board has taken all available measures to reduce expenses and increase revenues without sacrificing those programs, services and events that we believe are essential to the Club's mission. We have reduced the inventory kept in storage, stopped purchasing gear for the monthly raffles, and raffled gear that was left over from past auctions. Fixed costs, such as monthly dinner meeting expenses, insurance and speaker fees cannot be met entirely by these actions. The shortfall amounts to about \$2,000 annually. Shared among our 86 members, added donations would be about \$30 per member, including family members, assuming that 100% of our members actually made a donation.

Most of us remember that a very large, well-attended and bountifully stocked Super Auction funded the club for many years. With a shortage of people to manage the labor of this auction and buyers for gear, the auctions were discontinued. We have been coasting on the accrued gear and proceeds from past auctions until this year.

Currently, the speaker program for our monthly dinner meetings is funded through 2017. To continue this centerpiece of the club, we have raised dues a very modest amount and are asking members to consider making added donations to the Club as a 501(c)(3) organization.

I hope you will weigh the quality of the monthly programs, the memorable outings, and the people in your life which the club has enabled you to meet – and make an additional donation to keep the good times going. Thank you to all of our members for their continuing support and participation.

Consider taking up the opportunity and challenges which await you as Conservation Chair for Wilderness Fly Fishers. We need a leader for this important committee.

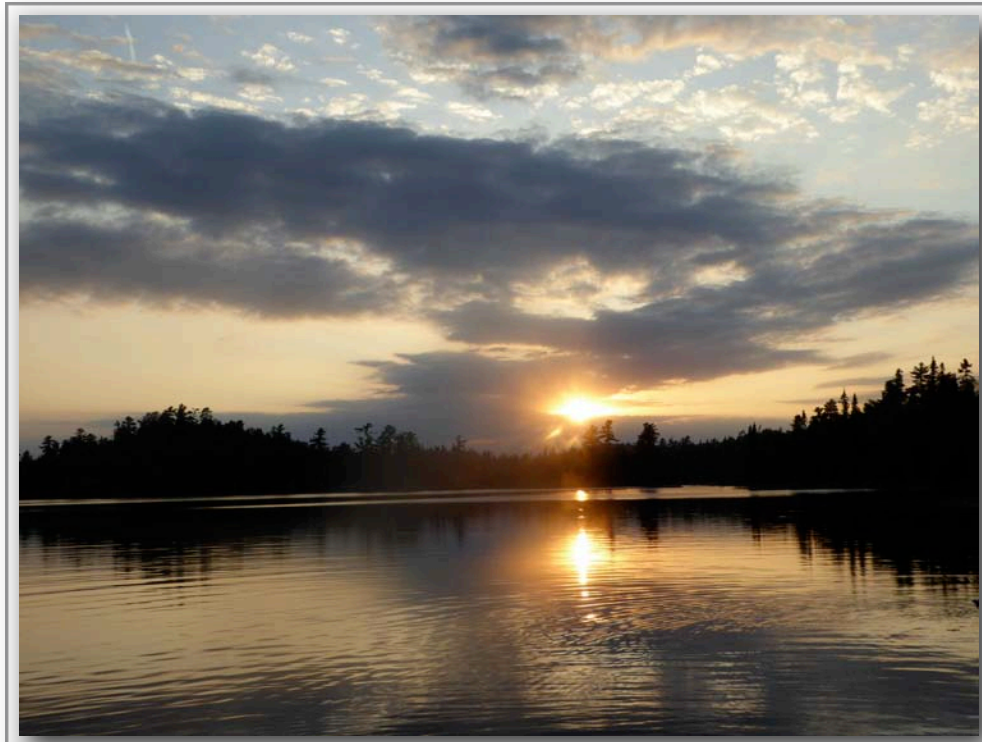
